Note: It is difficult to measure the frequency with which blacks and whites interacted with each other relative to the frequencies with which blacks interacted with blacks and whites with whites. It is obvious, however, that the number of interactions of blacks with whites had to equal the number of interactions of whites with blacks. Therefore, it is possible to measure the relative propensity of blacks and whites to lethal violence in interracial interactions by measuring the ratio of black victims to white victims in interracial homicides.

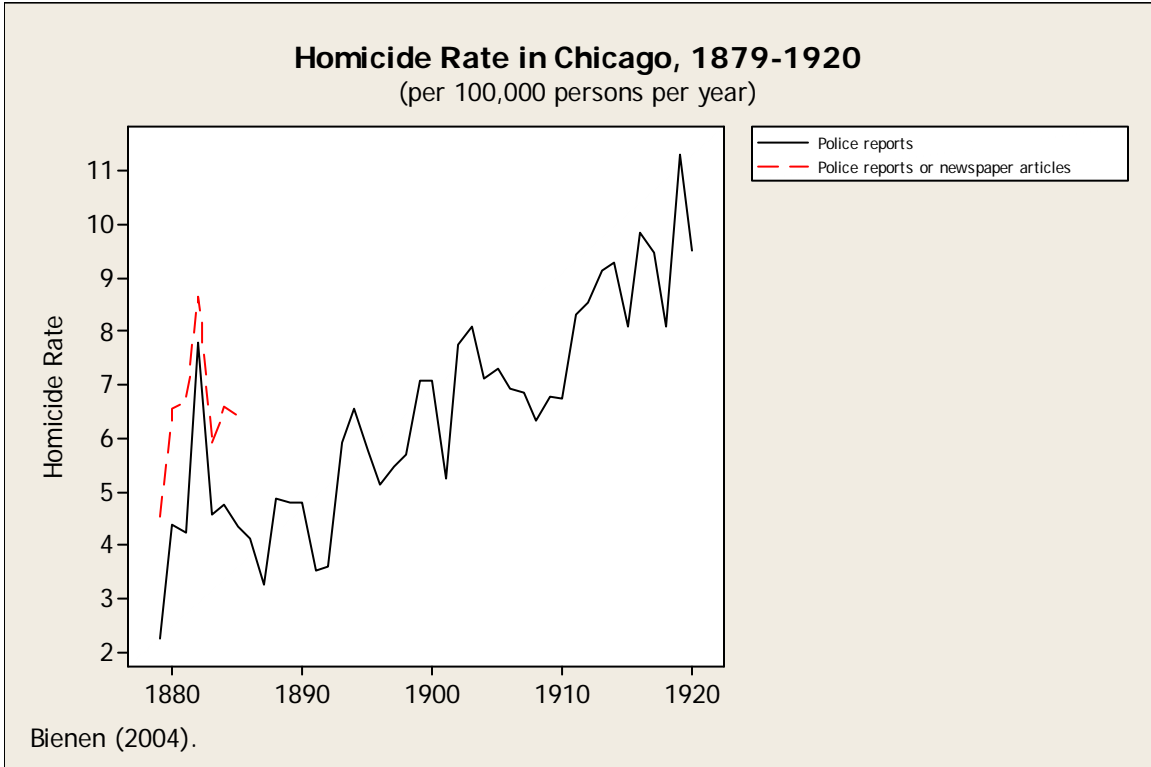


Figure 1: Homicide Rate in Chicago, 1879-1920 (per 100,000 persons per year). Source: Bienen (2004).

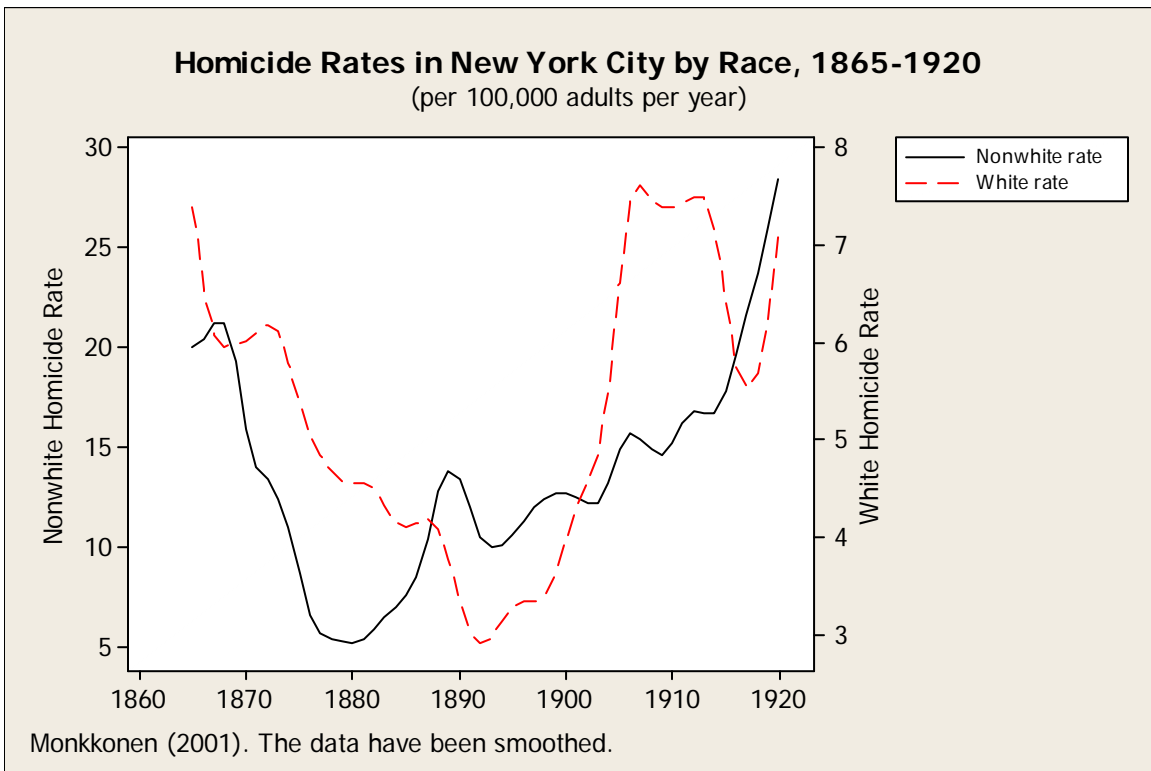


Figure 2: Homicide Rates in New York City by Race, 1865-1920 (per 100,000 adults per year). The data have been smoothed. Source: Monkkonen (2001).

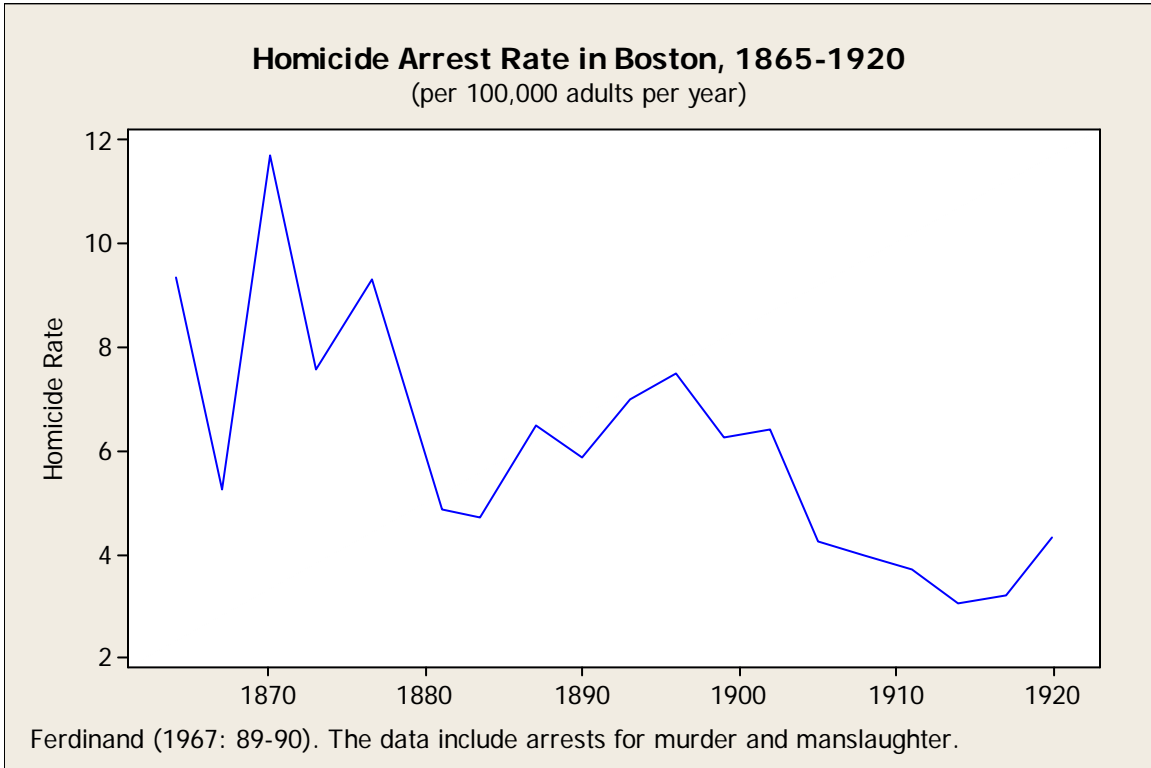


Figure 3: Homicide Arrest Rate in Boston, 1865-1920 (per 100,000 adults per year). The data include arrests for murder and manslaughter. Source: Ferdinand (1967: 89-90).
